Montefiore and Project SEARCH Prepare Students for Healthcare Careers

ontefiore is partnering with nonprofit agencies to prepare youth with developmental disabilities for the workplace, as part of Project SEARCH, at its Moses Campus and at Montefiore New Rochelle.

students with developmental disabilities to the professional world, Project SEARCH launched at the Moses Campus this past fall, and has been at Montefiore New Rochelle (MNR) for four years. The project is offered in conjunction with FEGS Health and Human Services at the Moses Campus and in partnership with Westchester Institute for Human Development and Westchester Disabled on the Move at MNR.

This academic year, 12 students from Bronx High School P721X, are participating in the program at the Moses Campus. Each day, the students receive one hour of work readiness skills education from a New York City Department of Education instructor and log four hours daily at their internship site, which include the Departments of Radiology, Nutrition and Environmental Services, to develop their practical training. A FEGS Integrated Employment Specialist also works in the classroom alongside the teacher and

job coaches to provide the students with on-site job coaching and support.

Students rotate through three different internships at the Moses Campus, remaining at each for 10 to 12 weeks, in order to develop an increasingly progressive set of concrete occupational skills and key soft skills, such as interpersonal and conflict resolution skills, says Dana Politis, Manager, Professional and Workforce Development Programs, Montefiore.

"This unique partnership advances the missions of Montefiore and FEGS, in preparing young people with the requisite skillset to succeed professionally, while also developing a more robust, highly-trained workforce, that can contribute to advancing the field of healthcare," says Ms. Politis.

Montefiore New Rochelle (MNR) is hosting five students this year as part of Project SEARCH, says Josephine Catalano, Volunteer Coordinator, Montefiore New
